So the Senate refused to adjourn.

Mr. Miles offered the following order:

Ordered, That the President request Senators, and other persons in attendance at the Senate Chamber, not to hold conversations whilst the yeas and nays are being called.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Goldsborough, of Dorchester, moved that the Senate take a recess for an hour.

Mr. Yellott submitted the following protest:

M. until twenty minutes past nine at night; and the printed copies of three of the important bills reported from the Judiciary Committee, and made the special order for this day, having been laid upon our desks but a few minutes since, and while we were much engaged with the consideration of the two other important measures, just ordered to be engrossed for a third read-
