Your Committee have also examined Warehouse No. 3, and find it in a very delapidated condition; being very old, the foundation having given away, and the walls are, in many places, cracked and warped; the building being otherwise in a condition that your Committee would not advise the expenditure of any money for repairs, believing that the interest of the State would be greatly promoted by having the house entirely rebuilt; the roofing, spouting, flooring and walls, are in a condition that almost renders it a perfect wreck. The condition of the house would indicate great want of attention on the part of the Inspector. Such, however, is the condition of the building, that your Committee could not attach any blame to him. Fronting this warehouse is a wharf belonging to the State. From the increased trade, your Committee would recommend the purchasing of the wharf adjoining the State Wharf, at the foot of Conway street, which would give sixty-eight feet more to the length of the present wharf, thereby affording more room so as to construct a pier, which would, in the judgment of your Committee, become a source of revenue.
