Your Committee visited Warehouse No. 5, and after a thorough examination find it in a most excellent condition. Throughout the entire building there is evidence of great care and attention on the part of the gentlemanly and polite Inspector, C. P. Montague. Upon an examination of the books of this Warehouse, we found the labor account to be greatly increased, and in justice to the Inspector your Committee state, that the unusually large quantity of Tobacco received from the West for storage, and the comparatively limited amount shipped, the Warehouse being filled, the Iespector, under the instruction of the Comptroller, rented other Warehouses, remote from his own, thereby causing him to incur the expense of a large number of extra hands. For the correctness of this, your Committee would respectfully refer you to the Comptroller's Report for 1860, page XIII.
