By an examination of the Comptroller's Report, it will be seen that the expenses for the year eighteen hundred and fifty-six, amounts to the sum of forty-seven thousand, seven hundred and six dollars and eleven cents, embracing the commissions, repairs of houses, wages of laborers, salaries of inspectors clerks, nails, and incidental expenses, and the gross amount received during said year from the State's Tobacco Inspectors, amounts to the sum of fifty-six thousand, five hundred and sixty-eight dollars and ninety-one cents, leaving a balance in favor of the tobacco fund for said year of eight thousand, eight hundred and sixty-two dollars and eighty cents; and it will further appear from the Comptroller's Report of 1857, the expenses amounted to the sum of fifty-seven thousand, two hundred and and fifty-eight dollars and thirty-seven cents, when the receipts for the said year amounted to the sum of eighty-seven thousand six hundred and eighty-five dollars and three cents, making the sum of thirty-nine thousand, two hundred and eighty-nine dollars and forty-six cents, applicable to paying the interest and principal upon the tobacco fund. Your Committee from an examination of the Comptroller's Report for 1858, find that the expenses for that year amount to the sum of sixty-four thousand, nine hundred and twenty dollars and fifty-eight cents, embracing the wages to laborers, salaries to inspectors clerks, incidental expenses, and for nails and the gross receipts of said year from the Tobacco Inspectors, amounted to \$70,798.02, leaving a balance in favor of the tobacco fund for said year, of five thousand, eight hundred and seventy-seven dollars and forty-four cents.

By an examination of the Comptroller's Report, it will be seen that the expenses for the year 1859, embracing the wages of laborers, incidental expenses, salaries of inspectors, clerks and for nails, amounted to ninety-four thousand two hundred and fifty-four dollars and fifty-one cents, whilst the gross receipts for the same period amounted to only ninety-two thousand, four hundred
