in the United States twelve years, during the whole of which time he has been giving instruction in the Modern Languages, and for the last five years as Professor in St. John's College.

6th. W. H. Thompson, A. M., Professor of Preparatory Department, was born, and has always lived, in Annapolis; is an Alumnus of St. John's College, and for twenty-one years has been an instructor in the same.

7th. Wm. H. Hopkins, A. B., Tutor, was born on the Eastern Shore of Maryland; is an Alumnus of St. John's College, and has been an instructor in the same since October last.

We would only add that, according to the Charter of St. John's College, no one can become a Professor in the same, without having first taken the oath of allegiance to the State of Maryland.

All of which is respectfully submitted, in behalf of the Visitors and Governors.
