- 2. Resolved, That we are aware of no existing inducement, founded on motives of expediency, that would justify or excuse the violation of our oath of office;

Mr. Archer, from the committee on Education, reported favorably a bill entitled, "An Act to add new sections to article 84 of the Code of Public General Laws, entitled 'Schools:'

Mr. Trail, from the committee on Federal Relations, reported favorably a bill entitled, "An Act to provide for the presentation of regimental flags to the Maryland regiments in the service of the United States;"

Which was read the first time.

On motion of Mr. Waters,

The rules were suspended, the bill read the second time, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

Mr. McCoy, from the committee on Claims, reported favorably a bill entitled, "An Act to refund to Sarah J. Offutt, executrix of J. W. Offutt, deceased, a certain sum of money erroneously paid by her into the State Treasury;"
