“ Enoch Pratt, Esq., two barrels of apples for Christmas.

“ B. Deford, Esq., five dollars to be expended for peaches
for children.

By table sixteen it will be seen that the whole amount paid
by the Superintendent this year is twenty-six thousand, eight
hundred and forty-eight and $\frac{64}{100}$ dollars, (\$26,848.64.)

From this should be deducted the following extraordinary ex-
penses—viz: repairs arising from boiler explosion—Improve-
ments, including building gallery for the Girls in the Chapel,
all of which amounts to seventeen hundred and fifty $\frac{55}{100}$ dollars,
(\$1,750.55,) which leaves the sum of twenty-five thousand, nine-
ty-seven $\frac{9}{100}$ dollars, (\$25,097.09,) for the actual amount paid by
me for the ordinary support and usual repairs of the Institution
for the year.

In closing the report, allow me to express my thanks to the
members of the Board for their kind co-operation in promoting
the welfare of the children, and to the officers and employees of
the Institution, who have so kindly labored with me the past
year.
