After the arrest of the Judges of Election a Cavalry patrol was stationed in the principal streets of the town with presented carbine, who have continued till this hour (2 o'clock P. M.) to ride up and down the streets while several others occupy the Court House. The most perfect quiet and good order has been preserved by the citizens.
