STATEMENT.

G. T. Renshaw, one of Judges of Election, HUNGARY NECK DISTRICT, SOMERSET COUNTY,

Of Proceedings at these Polls, Nov. 4, 1863.

Statement of George T. Renshaw, one of the Judges of Election in the Hungary Neck (No. 10) Election District of Somerset County, November 4th, 1863.

We the Judges of Election reached the place of voting in said District about 9 o'clock, A. M., and we found a squad of cavalry under command of a Sergeant, fully armed. They remained there during the day, around about the ballot box, one at least always being present.

The Sergeant said, before we opened the polls, that all who voted the white (or Crisfield) ticket, must take the oath before they could do so; and in obedience to his order, the oath was administered to all such. Persons voting the Democratic ticket or the yellow (Creswell) ticket, were not required to swear. Every ticket was by his ordes examined, and if Mr. Crisfield's name was on it, the voter was required to swear before he was allowed to vote. We polled only 69 votes; the full vote of the District is about 110 votes.
