has been an election in all the election districts in the several counties, and in all the voting precincts or wards of Baltimore city, free from the requirement of any unlawful oath by military authority, or from interference by the military, as hereinbefore set forth, and upon his receiving the full returns, certified to as hereinbefore required, and not before, he shall issue his proclamation declaring the number of votes cast "for convention," and "against convention," and the delegates elected thereto."
