Your committee further say that they have examined this Warehouse, and owing to its bad condition, would recommend the thorough repairs of its doors, windows, roofing and spouting, they would also recommend the cutting of a door between the two Houses, which we conceive would be a great saving of time and labor in the removal of Tobacco.

We also find the hoisting apparatus in this House in very bad condition, and we recommend that it be repaired. We would also recommend that the Inspector, James Turner, Esq., be empowered to have said repairs done at the expense of the State.

Your committee beg leave further to say that on examination they find that the present Inspector has paid into the State Treasury, up to the 1st of January, 1864, from the proceeds of this Warehouse, \$9,127.62, as will be seen by reference to the Comptroller's books.

A further statement of the affairs and workings of this House will be found in the report made by the Inspector to this General Assembly, all of which your committee deems unnecessary to repeat in this report.

Your Committee have also visited Warehouse Number 3, where we found the Inspector, Philemon Griffith, Esq., who conducted us through the building, which we found to be considerably out of repairs, a statement of which will hereafter be made.
