

On examination we find the total amount of inspections up to January 1st, 1864, to be 21,742 hhds.

Your Committee beg leave to say that on examination of this Warehouse, they find that one of the hatchways is very much broken, also the windows and roof are very much out of repair, and should have immediate attention. We would therefore recommend that the inspector, Mr. Griffith, be authorized to have the repairs done as soon as possible.

Your Committee beg leave to say, that on examination they find that the Inspector, Mr. Griffith, has paid into the Treasury, from this Warehouse, up to the 1st of January, 1864, the sum of \$8,691 77.

The further workings and affairs of this Warehouse, may be seen by by reference to the official report made by the Inspector to this General Assembly, which your Committee deems unnecessary to repeat in this report.

STATE TOBACCO WAREHOUSE NO. 4.

Your Committee visited Warehouse No. 4, and under the guidance of the Inspector, William Welsh, Esq., and his Clerks, proceeded to examine the building, which they are pleased to say they found in most excellent order, and but little repairs needed. The inspector has suggested to us what repairs should be done, and has made a memorandum of the same which is filed with this report, and we would recommend that Mr. Welsh, the Inspector, be empowered to have said repairs done. We think the cost will be very small.
