weigh fairly, impartially and without hatred or bias, and that I will not receive during the time I discharge the duties of weigher of grain, any fee or reward from any one, directly or indirectly, for the discharge of my duty other than that allowed by law; and that I will not buy or sell any grain, or act as agent for any one in buying or selling grain during the time I shall be employed and licensed as a weigher of grain; and that I will in all other respects discharge the duties of a weigher of grain to the best of my skill and judgment, so help me God.

"In all cases it shall be optional with the owners of such grain whether it shall be so weighed or not."

The question being on the adoption of the amendment,
