Young, Shaw, Brown, Hebb, Ecker, Waters, Starr and Sykes.

The proceedings of yesterday were read and approved.

Mr. Stockbridge, from the committee on the Judiciary, reported favorably the following Senate bills:

A bill entitled, "An Act to add the following sections, relating to covenants in deeds of conveyance, to article 24 of the Code of Public General Laws relating to conveyancing, and to follow section 71:"

A bill entitled, "An Act to make valid a deed from Charles H. Carroll, of the State of New York, to William F. Carroll, of Washington City, D. C.;"

A bill entitled, "An Act to legalize the official acts of Robert K. Wilson, a justice of the peace for Queen Anne's county;"

Which were read the second time.

Mr. McCoy, from the committee on Claims, submitted the following

REPORT.

The committee on Claims, to which was referred an order of this House of March 2d, 1864, instructing them to readjust the mileage of the members of the General Assembly, respectfully report:

That the Constitution of Maryland provides that the members of the General Assembly shall receive a per diem of four dollars, and such mileage as may be allowed by law. This constitutional provision seems to justify the conclusion that, while the per diem of members is fixed and unchangeable, their mileage is left to be adjusted according to the varying circumstances which might arise.

The committee, having in view the peculiar and unprecedented condition of the currency of the country at this time, and the greatly enhanced cost of travel and living in consequence thereof, have deemed it just and right to provide as near as may be for equalizing the compensation of members with that of previous Legislatures, and therefore respectfully recommend the adoption of the following joint resolution:

Recolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the sum of one hundred dollars, in addition to their usual mileage, be paid to each of the Senators and Delegates of this General Assembly.
