Mr. Stockbridge, from the committee on the Judiciary, reported unfavorably the following bills:

A bill entitled, "An Act to make valid a certain deed therein mentioned;"

A bill entitled, "An Act to make valid a deed from Elizabeth Gearhart and others, to Joel W. Marsh; and also, a deed from Michael Jones and Catharine his wife, to Henry Rowland; and also, a deed from the said Michael Jones and wife, to John Feidt;

Which were read the first time.

Also, favorably upon the following bills:

A bill entitled, "An Act to alter and change the name of Alfred Johnson, to William F. Johnson."

A bill entitled, "An Act to repeal the 155th and 156th sections of the 30th article of the Code of Public General Laws relating to perjury, and to re-enact the same with amendments."

A bill entitled "An Act to make valid the acknowledgment of a deed from Abraham Isenhart and Barbara his wife, to John Trenear;"

Which were read the first time.

Mr. Lester presented the following message:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES,

January 20, 1864.

Mr. McCoy, from the committee on Claims, reported favorably a bill entitled, "An Act appropriating a certain sum
