By virtue of a Commission to us directed bearing date the 20th day
of March 1735 To examine Enquiries in relation to the Bound of a tract of Land called Dalm belonging
to the said John Martin Robinson and in the County of Somerset and being more in full than the said John Martin Robinson
Subscribers being qualified have appointed a day as the law directs and have met
on the aforesaid Land and caused to come before us this 20th day of June 1736 James Stephenson
Aged 57 or thereabouts being sworn on the holy Evangelist of Almighty God, do say that Mr
W^m Robinson sen^r came with him and told him that the white Oak standing by the side
of a swamp or branch distance 14 paces from the said branch was the corner tree of his Land
and further saith not. Affradare Johnson Aged 67 or thereabouts being sworn as aforesaid do say
that the white Oak called and known by the name of Coleman's Horns, standing upon pocomoake
River swamps at upper end of newhall town that Ellis Coleman told him severall times that

of Coleman's Land and further saith not. Sworn as aforesaid do say that Ellis Coleman told

Middle sex In behalf of a certain Adam Spence told him that the aforesaid white Oak was
