Somerset J. Ralph Milburn aged forty two years or there abouts deponent on the holy Evangelist of Almighty God and saith that some few years ago he was in company with Mr Francis Allen and Mr Willm Lane then a starting of depositions in relation to the bounds of a certain tract of Land now in possession of Daniel Hull and the Examination of William Callin Examined by the above said Mr Allen whether a certain white oak that is now in sight was a bounder of the above said Land, and William Callin said he believed so (which white Oak is an Oak that stands on the south side of the Road that Leads from William Boston to where Daniel Hull now Lives not far from the said Hulls with sixteen notches in) the deponent further saith that Mr Allen asked the above said Callin if it was the first bounder of the above said Land and Callin said he believed it was not, and then Mr Allen asked him if he knew where it was and he said noe, if he did he would have shew'd it before now, and have ended the dispute and some small time on the same day that the above said Callin was Examined by the above said Mr Allen and Mr Lane that the deponent said he asked William Callin (if he knew) where the first bounder of the above said Land was and Callin said pointing his hand from the above said white Oak down towards the dam and said that he believed it stood down on the dams side & further the deponent saith not th Ag^t 19th 1735 In Waters Wm Waters Wm Turgui Junr
