I further certify, that a negro man now present, (the bearer hereof) called and known by the name of Henry Hyuson, aged about forty years, five feet $9\frac{3}{4}$ inches high, of a dark complexion, and has a small scar under the right ear, has proved by testimony, which is satisfactory to me, that he is the identical person mentioned and described by the name of Henry Hyuson in the deed of Manumission above referred to, and that he was raised in Kent County.

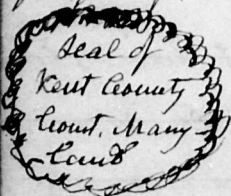
