of all documents which have been filed in the Council Chamber, in virtue of, or in consequence of the provisions of the act of the General Assembly, entitled, an act for the promotion of Internal Improvement, passed at the adjourned May session, 1836, ch. 395, and that they report such other information in their power, which may enable this House to determine whether this state is in law or equity bound by any one or more of the improvement Companies mentioned in said act, under color of the provisions thereof, and whether the said act or any part thereof may be lawfully repealed or modified by the General Assembly. I, in the absence of the Council herewith transmit to you several documents marked A. B. C. D_E. & F., which with several others that were communicated by the Executive to the last General Assembly, and those communicated to you on the 28th instant, will afford you all the information within the embrace of your order, which the Executive have, at any time possessed.

Ordered, that the committee on agriculture be and they are hereby required to enquire into the propriety and expediency of establishing Agricultural Schools in the several counties of this State, and report to this house by bill or otherwise.

On motion of Mr. Alexander,

Ordered, that the Treasurer for the Western Shore be, and he is hereby required to furnish this house with all documents, or copies of all documents which have been filed in the Treasury Office, in virtue of, or in consequence of the provisions of the act of the General Assembly, entitled, an act for the promotion of Internal Improvement, passed at the adjourned May Session, of 1836, chapter 395.
