The committee to whom was referred the memorial of sundry citizens of Anne Arundel county, praying that the district system of trxation, for the support of primary schools, may be abolished, and that a sum sufficient for their support, may be levied by county assessment, so far as the same relates to Anne Arundel county, beg leave to make the following

REPORT:

That taking into consideration the large number, and the high respectability of the petitioners, as also the importance of education, viewed either in a moral or political point—and that upon the general diffusion of education, must depend, in a great measure, the stability and vitality of our republican institutions. That point, once conceded, which few or none will deny, it then follows as a matter of course, that it is an object of more importance than any other subject which can occupy the attention of legislators—and believing that the primary school system, with such amendments as experience will from time to time direct, to be one of the cheapest and best modes of carrying out the above views, beg leave to report the following bill, and recommend its passage.
