Also, the bill, entitled, an act extending the time of the statutes of limitations, as applied to claims against real estate;

Severally endorsed, 'will not pass;'

And delivered a bill, originated in and passed by the senate, entitled, an act supplemental to an act, entitled, an act respecting the equity jurisdiction of county courts,

Which was read and referred to the committee on grievances and courts of justice.
