Also, the bill from the senate, entitled, an act supplemental to an act, entitled, an act respecting the equity jurisdiction of county

courts;

Also, the bill from the senate, entitled, an act to authorise William

Price to execute a certain deed to Elizabeth Lawrence;

Also, the resolution from the senate, requiring the judges of the several election districts of Anne Arundel county to ascertain the sense of the people of said county relative to the erection of Howard District;

Also, the report and resolutions from the senate, relative to a retrocession of a part of the territory of the District of Columbia to the State of Maryland,

Were severally taken up for consideration, and read the second time, severally rejected, and returned to the senate.

Mr. Iglehart submitted the following message, which was read, assented to and sent to the senate:

By the House of Delegates, March, 30th, 1838.

Gentlemn of the Senate,

The mass of business before this house has prevented us from bestowing as much consideration upon the bills from your honorable body herewith returned, and not passed by us, as their importance seemed to require. We accompany them with this explanation that the unfavotable action may, not prejudice these measures in the estimation of subsequent legislatures.
