The Senate met. Present the same Senators as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The resolutions declaratory of the rights of the citizens of this State over their fugitive slaves, assented to by the Senate on yesterday, and the message in relation thereto, were sent to the house of delegates.

The bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Maryland and New York Iron and Coal Company, was read the second time and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

It was accordingly engrossed,

Read the third time by special order, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

On motion of Mr. Tidball,

The bill entitled, a further additional supplement to an act entitled, an act to reduce into one, the several acts of Assembly respecting elections, and to regulate said elections, passed at December session 1832, chapter 275, was taken up for consideration, read the second time, and

On motion of Mr. Brown,

Ordered to lie on the table.

The bill entitled, an act in relation to a road authorised to be opened by an act passed at December session 1832, chapter 158, and its supplements, was read the second time, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

It was accordingly engrossed,

Read the third time by special order, passed and sent to the house of delegates.

The bill entitled, an act relating to a road proposed to be opened from the village of Frizzlesburgh, on the Taneytown road, thence to Messenger's mill, thence to St. Mary's church, and thence to the Reisterstown Turnpike road, at or near Joseph Kiefer's Tavern, situate in Carroll county, and distinguished among the land records in Frederick county, by No. 168 roads, was read the second time and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.
