red the resolution authorising the Librarian to furnish two sets of the laws, to the clerk and register of wills of Carroll county, and

A resolution authorising the librarian to furnish certain reports for the use of Carroll county, reported favorably thereon.

They were severally read the second and by special order the third

time, assented to and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Bruce from the committee to which the leave was granted, reported a bill entitled, a supplement to the act to incorporate the Boston and New York Coal Company, passed December session 1835,

Which was read the first time.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill entitled, an act to guard against frauds in the exercise of the elective franchise in the city of Baltimore,

Which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Jones,

Brown and Tidball.

On motion of Mr. Bruce,

The bill entitled, a supplement to the act to incorporate the Boston and New York Coal Company, was read the second time by special order and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

It was accordingly engrossed, and

On motion of Mr. Bruce.

Read the third time, by special order, assented to, and sent to

the house of delegates.

Mr. Hambleton from the committee on divorces, to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to divorce Theresa Kann of the city of Baltimore, from her husband Julius Kann, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

On motion of Mr. Cottman,

He was excused from serving on the committee to count the ballots in the election to be had for a director on the part of the State, in the Hagerstown bank. Mr. Hambleton was appointed to supply the va-

The appointed hour having arrived, the Senate proceeded to the election of a director on the part of the State, in the Hagerstown bank. The ballot box was prepared, and the ballots deposited there-It was sealed up and delivered to Messrs. Tidball and Hambleton, who had been appointed conjointly with the committee of the house of delegates to count the ballots and report the result. They retired, and after a time returned and reported that they had examined the ballot box, and had ascertained there had been 58 votes given in all, of which Frederick Dorsey had 45 votes, and there were 9 blanks and 4 scattering votes.

Whereupon it was declared, that Frederick Dorsey, is duly elected a director on the part of the State, in the Hagerstown bank, to supply the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Alexander Neill.

The Senate adjourned until Monday morning ten o'clock,
