Mr. Bowie from the committee on internal improvement, to which was referred the resolutions relative to the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company and the Baltimore and Ohio Rail Road Company, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time and the question put,

So it was determined in the affirmative, and the resolutions returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Tidball from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to authorise the building a Bridge over Bynum's run in Harford county, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Tidball from the committee on judicial proceedings, to which was referred the bill entitled, an act extending the time of the Statutes of Limitation as applied to claims against real estate, reported that the committee were of opinion it ought not to pass.

It was read the second and by special order the third time, rejected and returned to the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered the following message:
