severally endorsed "will not pass."

The bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act for the better regulation of Chancery proceedings, in certain cases, passed at December session 1820, chapter 161, and

The bill entitled, an act to alter, repeal and abolish all that part of the constitution and form of government which inhibits the Senate

from originating or amending a money bill.

Mr. Tidball submitted the following message; which was read and adopted, and with the bill to which it refers, sent to the house of delegates.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We herewith return and respectfully request that you will reconsider a bill entitled, a supplement to "an act for the better regulation of Chancery proceedings in certain cases, passed at December session 1820, chapter 161, and that you will pass the same.

On motion of Mr Cottman,

The following order was read and adopted:

Ordered, That the Senate Chamber and committee room be painted during the recess of the Senate, under the direction of the clerk of the Senate; and that he cause to be procured the furniture necessary for the accommodation of the Senate to be elected under the new constitution, and that he further cause the furniture now in the Chamber to be repaired, so as to make the whole correspond.

On motion of Mr. Tidball,

The bill entitled, an act to abolish in the State of Maryland, the law of imprisonment for debt, from and after the end of the next annual session of the General Assembly, was reconsidered, rejected and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Tidball from the committee on judicial proceedings, to which was referred the bill entitled, an act to repair injuries done by fire

from Rail Road Engines, reported favorably thereon.
