Bemis, Jacob Forwood, Edward Prigg and Stephen Lewis, citizens of Maryland, for the alleged crime of kidnapping; and such modification of the laws of that state relating to negroes, as will effectually recognize the right of the master to arrest, and bring away his absconding slave, and we have appointed Messrs. Maulsby and Alexander, to join such gentleman as may be named by your honorable body, to constitute such deputation.
