

that they are all good, and that the institution will not lose any thing by any of these transactions, as they are expected to be paid at maturity.

We conclude our notice of the finances, by annexing statements prepared at the Penitentiary, showing a comparative view of their condition for the last two years, ending on the 30th November, 1836, 1837. We have mentioned the cause to which we believe the differences in the transactions for these years may be fairly attributed. They by no means involve any charge or suspicion of infidelity on the part of the authorities of the institution, but on the contrary, show that to its fiscal concerns they have always paid the strictest attention. Your committee rely on their zeal and capacity, and invoke for them the support and confidence of the people.

We also annex other statements, showing the condition of the prison in other respects which could not be presented so well in a different manner.
