Whice was read and referred to the committee on judicial proceed-

ings.

On motion of Mr. Brown,

The bill entitled, an act to condemn and make public Cemetery avenue, as now opened in the city of Baltimore, was read the third time by special order, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Tidball submitted the following message; which was read and

adopted:

By the Senate,

February 8, 1838.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We respectfully request your honorable body to return the preamble and resolutions relating to the establishment of a national foundary at Havre de Grace, in this State, which were passed by the Senate and sent to you this day: the Senate desire to give to said resolutions further consideration.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill entitled, a supplement to an act to establish State Tobacco Warehouses in the city of Baltimore,

Which was read the first time and referred to Messis. Brown,

Lee and Goldsborough.

On motion of Mr. Hambleton.

The bill entitled, an act to divorce Horatio R. Merryman of the State of Maryland, from his wife Sarah A. Merryman, was read the third time by special order, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Brown from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, a supplement to an act to establish State Tobacco Warehouses

in the city of Baltimore, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time, passed

and returned to the house of delegates.

The Senate proceeded to ballot for Bank Directors. The ballot box was prepared and the ballots deposited therein. It was sealed up and delivered to Messrs. Goldsborough and Bruce, who had been appointed by the Senate, conjointly with the committee of the house of delegates, to count the ballots and report the result. They retired, and after a time returned and reported, that they had discharged the duty assigned them, and had ascertained there had been 72 votes given in all—of which, for the Mechanics Bank of Baltimore, Francis Neale had 37 votes and John W. Smith had 45 votes; for the Farmers Bank of Maryland, Nicholas Brewer, junr. had 39 votes, Richard Swann had 44 votes and Benjamin L. Gantt had 44 votes; for the branch of the Farmers Bank of Maryland at Easton, James Price
