

The deposition of Mr. Thomas Dashiell sen^r aged severie two years or thereabouts being sworn saith that severall years ago he was in company with severall persons att a gum tree standing in the northmost first branch that makes out of the main branch of great monge about one quarter of a mile from the brige that is on the main road that led over Monge near to the house of Thomas Carey the said tree standing in the said branch between two clearings and that this deponent then heard severall say that ^{the} gum tree was the first boulder of the Land that Thomas Carey then lived on and this deponent further saith that the surveyer at the same time began at the said tree and run to the second boulder and came within about a chaced length of the second boulder or thereabouts and funder saith not

The deposition of Jacob Crouch aged fifty five years or thereabouts being sworn on the holy evangelist of almighty God deposeth and sayeth that he was present with Mr. Thomas Dashiell and severall others about thirty years by past at the Running out of the Land where Thomas Carey now lives called Carys adventure and that Levin Denwood shewed them the marked gum which is above described In Mr. Dashiells deposition and said it was the first boulder of Carys adventure and this deponent sayeth that they run the course of the said Land and that it came near to the other boulders and further sayeth not Jacob Crouch -

The deposition of Henry Dorman sen^r aged sixty six years or thereabouts being sworn sayeth that about thirty years by past William Carey shewed him a marked red oak which stands on the main branch of monge about a hundred and fifty yards above a house where Williamson Luke now lives by the branch side and the said Carey told him that it was a boulder of the fourth land belonging to Thomas Carey but did not tell him whether it was first or second and this deponent further sayeth that about seven or eight years by past he was in the woods with Cary: Philip Covington and the said Covington - shewed him the same tree and told him that that tree was a boulder of the fourth Land - belonging to Thomas Carey and funder saith not Henry Dorman -
