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Mary Riggan the wife of Teague Riggan the Elder she upon her Oath declared that near the place where she now stands called the Cyster shell Hammock her husband employed one Richard (whom she knew he left Lancashire) to build him alone who as he said cut down a great tree upon the said Hammock to make a post for the house which he said was annoyed her and that she was afraid he had done him a prejudice but that he would or had made him amends for that he either ^{had or} would make him another tree lower down upon the Creek and further saith not.

James Neare

John Riggan of Somerset County planter aged fifty six years or there about being sworn on the holy Evangelist of almighty God by the said Commissioners Deposit and saith that near the place sworn to by the former witness he saw a small cedar tree that stoop over the Water mark with four Notches on two sides but that he did not take notice whether it was marked on the other two sides or not and that his father Teague Riggan the Elder and all the neighbours acknowledged that to be the corner tree of the Land called the Golden Lyon and that at the time of the Examination of Mary Riggan the wife of Teague Riggan the Elder before William Holland James Neare and John Cullen she being an ancient woman was lead by the hand to the place where he now stands it being on the uppermost cyster shell Hammock and that upon her said oath she said that she

heard say that the tree was here and further saith not — John ^{his} Riggan depos

Mary Riggan the wife of John Riggan aged forty eight years or there abouts — being sworn on the holy Evangelist of almighty God by the said Commissioners aforesaid Deposit and saith that Sarah Dickerson the wife of Peter Dickerson told this deponent that the tree that John Riggan and James Dickerson had made oath to as the first bounder of the Land called the Golden Lyon she knew the said tree to be marked and that it was a cedar tree and that the said tree leaned over into the Creek and that she hath many times stood — on the same tree to fence thread in the Creek and that there was a mark tree Right

against the same cedar which was fell sore against her will and this deponent further saith that at the time that William Holland, James Neare and John Cullen were Examining James Dickerson on oath in Relation to the bounder of the Land called the Golden Lyon he the said James Dickerson upon his said oath did declare that Ambrose Riggan and Peter Dickerson employed him the said James Dickerson to divide the said Land between them as is before expressed by the deposition of Teague Riggan by cutting a ditch which ditch he saith to fall and that Ambrose Riggan paid him £10 and half for his part of cutting the said ditch and further saith not — Mary ^{her} Riggan
