white oake now in his view and told him that tree was the bounder of four tracts of land and that tract called Glenneath was one of them which tree stands on the westernmost side of Pocomoke River about fifty yards from the said River upon a point of high Land -

near the side of a small gutt known by the name of Catt gutt and further saith not.

June the 7th 1736 / Alexander Macredy of Somerset County planter aged fifty

years or there abouts being by us sworn upon the holy evangelist of almighty God deposeth and saith that about thirty years ago (to the best of his knowledge) he was shewed

an old rotten Oak stump near the head of Pocomoke Bay where we caused a pine sapling to be slipped on four sides between Spencerville and Michal Cliftons plantation

and was told that was the bounder between Michal Cliftons and Edward Howards land but saw no markes in it and this deponent further saith that some years after he

was in company with M^r. William Whittington the then Surveyor who was employed

by Michal Cliften aforesaid to run out some part of his land in order to discover some

land which he apprehended to be vacant and that the said Whittington then began at the aforesaid old stump and further saith not - The above deposition was taken before us the

subscribers being first duly qualifed according to Law the day and year above written

years or there abouts being sworn upon the holy evangelist of almighty God deposeth and saith that about twenty eight or twenty nine years ago Michal Cliften aforesaid

and M^r. W^m Whittington who was then Surveyor to lay out some part of his land in

order to discover if there was any vacant at the head of his land and that they began

at a rotten old oak stump to the best of his knowledge their was no markes to be

seen in it standing between Spencerville and Michal Cliftons plantation where

we caused a small pine to be slipped on four sides standing within ten or a dozen

yards of the bayside and further saith not -

June the 7th 1736 Sarah Byer wife of Robert Byer of Somerset County aged fifty years or there abouts being sworn on the holy Evangelist of almighty God deposeth and saith that about thirty years ago she saw Philip Conaway and John Manlove put their hands upon a white oake now in her view standing on the west side of Pocomoke River about fifty yards from the said River near a small gutt called Catt gutt and that they told her that Jenkins Bens man told them that was Jenkins Bens tree and further saith not -
