Somerset County Gent: Surveyor of the County Aſt: for the Rgo: Mr: James Robertson of a tract of Land  
called Glynvells Lott when the said Surveyor had Run some lines to lay out the length of the line or  
Distances he the said Robertson claimed to Run his Land from the mouth of Thudford Creek up Monocan &  
a place usually made use of by John Stalke to build before, at and about thirty three yards below  
River at a place by a mill of marsh about one hundred and fifty four yards from and below where the marsh.  
Rd: And the River Monocan doys the first Land the said Robertson prepared to the Rgo: John Tunstall  
making a boundary for his the said Robertsons Land but the said Tunstall required to doys in doing it and  
said there was an antient line of marked trees between his Land and that of the said Robertsons which had  
been marked before he knew the Lands and he would make or agree to no other boundaries or to this Effect  
{ Levin Hale.

The Deposition of George Shebbs of Somerset County aged about thirtynine years or thereabouts.  
Being sworn on the holy Evangelist of almighty God deposeth and saith that when Capt: Smith died  
on the Plantation that Capt: John Tunstall lived on now that he saw a pine tree marked standing  
near the River side of the south side thereof and there or there about the tree stood and the deponent  
further saith that the said tree was allways adceded the bounder of Glynvells Lott and it could be plainly  
seen from the house where Capt: Smith died and further saith not at which place this deponent  
saw the tree stood we the Commissioners saw a cedar post fixed there it being one hundred and fifty four  
yards below Capt: Tunstalls ship yard and thirty three yards below where the marsh doys the  
high land

William Maclemey of Somerset County aged about forty years being sworn on the  
holy Evangelist of almighty God deposeth and saith that at a survey made by David Wilson for  
Mr: Robinson on a certain tract of Land called Glynvells Lott and there happened some words . . .  
Between Capt: Tunstall and Mr: Robinson both of the Rgo: County and the Rgo: Robinson told Tunstall  
he would make a tree between them and the Rgo: Tunstall would not agree to make a tree for there  
was old timber and he would stand to no other and further saith not . . . . . Willm Maclemey  
Lewis Riggsby of Somerset County aged about sixty years being sworn on the holy evangelist of  
almighty
