

And he should have taken that writ that he should make return to the Justice of the Peace at the same and place as before and that he should have then and there the names of those before whom he should make the same known &c.
Second Tuesday in June 1747 comes the said John Moore before the Justice of the Peace his attorney and offers himself against the said warrant in the Peace and the Sheriff of the County returns to the Court here the Writ of Habeas Corpus &c.

Charles County To the Honorable the Justice within mentioned I hereby certify that on the 11th day of May 1747 I attached in the hands of Mary Anne Atchison as the effects of the within mentioned warrant the whole damages due within the County for the use of the within mentioned John Moore and the same known to the above named her that he be and appear at the time and place within mentioned to show cause why he hath not by the effects so attached in her hands should not be condemned for the use of the above mentioned John Moore according to law attached before William Hanson and John Howard Good and lawful men of my County which as I say here by Deeds

Whereupon the said John Moore by his attorney prays condemnation of his damages assessed to two thousand forty pounds of tobacco and also of his costs and charges by him and about the premises laid out and expended as aforesaid attached in the hands of the said Mary Anne Atchison with execution thereof to be adjudged and the said Mary Anne Atchison at this solemnly called Court to be taken in his default. Therefore it is considered by the Court here that the said John Moore have condemnation in the hands of the said Mary Anne Atchison for so much the sum of two thousand and forty pounds of tobacco damages as two thousand and sixty six pounds of tobacco for his costs and charges by him and about the premises laid out and expended, by the Court here adjudged according to the form and effect of the act of Assembly in that behalf made and provided and that the said John Moore have thereof Execution &c.

H. John Hepburn of the County of Charles
John Mc'hee Judgment: Confess

It was commanded the Sheriff that he should take John Mc'hee late of Charles County Planter of the County and him safe keep so that he should have his body before the Justice of the Peace of the County of the Lord Proprietor of his County Court to be holden at Charlestown on the 2nd Tuesday in June next to answer to John Hepburn of the County of Sussepa upon the Peace and that he should have then and there that writ &c.
At which day to wit the said Tuesday in June 1747 comes the said John Hepburn by Thomas Clark his attorney and offers himself against the said John Mc'hee in the Peace and the Sheriff of the County returns to the Court here that he has taken the body of the said John Mc'hee

Whereupon
