Whereupon into Court here in his proper Person Comes thereto George Lanphier doth acknowledge himself to owe and stand Justly Indebted unto his Lordship the Lord Proprietary In the sum of Forty Pounds Current Money of Maryland and also in like manner Came Hugh Long and John Hamill of same County and acknowledge themselves to owe and stand Justly Indebted unto his said Lordship In the sum of Twenty Pounds like Money each with sums they and Every of them severally quitted and granted should be made and levied on their and Every of their goods and Chattels Land and Tenements to the use of his said Lordship his Heirs and Successors On condition that the said George Lanphier do keep Good Rule and Order and does not suffer any loose or disorderly Persons to Apper before him or commit other Disorders or Irregularities contrary to the true Intent and meaning of the Act of Assembly Concerning Ordinarys and for the Better regulating Inn Holders and Ordinary Keepers within this Province

Whereupon into Court here in his proper Person Comes thereto Andrew Monroe and doth acknowledge himself to owe and stand Justly Indebted unto his Lordship the Lord Proprietary In the sum of Forty Pounds Current Money of Maryland and also in like manner Came William Matthews and John Chapman of same County and acknowledge themselves to owe and stand Justly Indebted unto his said Lordship In the sum of Twenty Pounds like Money each with sums they and Every of them severally quitted and granted should be made and levied on their and Every of their goods and Chattels Land and Tenements to the use of his said Lordship his Heirs and Successors On condition that the said Andrew Monroe do keep Good Rule and Order and does not suffer any loose or disorderly Persons to Apper before him or commit other Disorders or Irregularities contrary to the true Intent and meaning of the Act of Assembly Concerning Ordinarys and for the Better regulating Inn Holders and Ordinary Keepers within this Province

On condition that the said Timothy MacLean shall make his personal appearance here from day to day during the sitting of this Court to answer unto all such things as shall be objected against him on behalf of his Lordship the Lord Proprietary and to stand so and abide by the judgment of this Court and in the mean time keep the peace and be of good behaviour toward his said Lordship the Lord Proprietary and all other People of this Province and not depart the same Court without leave thereof
