Gentleman one of our said Justices of our said Court at Charles Town a.p. the fourteenth day of  
June in the Thirty fifth year of our Dominion V<sup>o</sup> Anno Domini 1759  
Spued July 6<sup>th</sup> 1759

Lordwick Adams aged fifty seven years or thereabouts being solemnly sworn Deposeth and saith  
that at Stone now lying on the North side of the Little Dam and a short way near the side of the  
said Dam that there is thereabouts is the Beginning of a certain tract of Land called Frog Nest  
and that his Father Charles Adams now Deceased in his Lifetime Carried him to a  
spot where the said Stone now lies and told him the said Deponent that thereabouts was the  
Beginning of the a.p. tract of Land called Frog Nest, this Deponent further saith that his a.p.  
Deceased Father about thirty years ago as they were walking in the Woods together Clapt his foot  
against a hickory tree wounded and now the same and said it was the second Woundtree of the a.p.  
Frog Nest which said tree now stands where a Path or Road that Leads out the Forest to  
Chukamuccon Warehouse and near the head of a Valley or Facing Ground and this  
Deponent further saith that his father a.p. carried him to a wounded  
tree being a Poplar standing in the East side of a Branch called the Horse Bone Branch  
and told him that was the Third Wound tree of Frog Nest, and further this Deponent saith that

Charles Adams aged thirty nine years or thereabouts being solemnly sworn Deposeth and  
saith that the Beginning Wound tree of a certain tract of Land called Frog Nest stood where  
he thinks by Information of his Father within five or ten feet of a stone now laid for the Beginning of  
the a.p. Land and that the said tree was cut Down by a Jacke who was hired by this Deponents  
said Father and had a sharp Reprimand for doing this Deponent further saith that his Father  
Charles Adams in his Lifetime told him that a hickory now standing near a path or Road that  
Leads out the forest to Chukamuccon Warehouse and near the head of a Valley or Facing Ground was  
his Wound tree this Deponent further saith that a poplar standing in the East side of a Branch  
called the Horse Bone Branch is the Third Wound tree of the a.p. Land, this Deponent  
further saith that a Red Oak standing on a hill side near a small Branch that makes  
out of the south side of the Little Dam the Deponents Father told him was his last Wound tree

William Shinnor aged forty seven years or thereabouts being solemnly sworn Deposeth  
and saith that Charles Adams now Deceased in his Lifetime one Sunday Carried him to  
Hickory then wounded and now standing near a path or Road that Leads out the Forest to Chukamuccon  
Warehouse and on the North side and near the head of a Valley which tree the said  
Adams told this Deponent was his Wound Hickory this Deponent further saith that  
Charles Adams Deceased a.p. Carried him through a Branch called the Horse Bone  
Branch and Clapt his foot against a Poplar now standing in said Branch and  
said it was his last Wound tree, this Deponent further saith that the same day the  
a.p. Charles Adams Deceased in his Lifetime Carried him to a Red Oak standing on  
a hill side near a small Branch that makes out of the south side of the Little Dam  
now fairly wounded which the said Adams Deceased a.p. told this Deponent that  
thats his last Wound tree and saith Not
