The following Joint Resolution by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States, is published for the information of the Army, and all concerned:

Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the bounties heretofore paid, under Regulations and Orders from the War department, to men enlisting in the regular or volunteer forces of the United States for three years or during the war, shall continue to be paid from the 5th day of January, 1864, until the 1st day of March next, anything in the act approved December 23, 1863, to the contrary notwithstanding. This resolution to be in force from and after its passage.
