

ITEMS—GENERAL AND LOCAL.

The quota of the city of New York under the new call is reported at 7,300.

The communication sent by "one of the literati," on the scarcity of eggs, has been respectfully referred to the "old hen's relief association."

The returned prisoners belonging to the 9th Maryland Regiment left on last Tuesday morning for Baltimore. The term of enlistment was out sometime ago and the Regiment disbanded.

Major General HALLECK has been relieved at his own request, from duty as General-in-Chief of the army and Lieutenant General GRANT assigned to the command. Lieutenant General GRANT will still remain in the field.

We would respectfully suggest to the proper authorities, that some arrangement should be made, by which citizens who arrive on the flag of truce boat from Richmond, can secure transportation to Washington or Baltimore. At each arrival of the boat some of this class of persons come with our soldiers. They were in most cases taken prisoners, while in the employ of the government, and it is nothing more than right that they should have a free passage to Washington.

On Wednesday the 16th, over four hundred released prisoners arrived on the flag of truce boat.—Among these were more than forty officers. General NEAL DOW, Captains SAWYER and FLYNN, were of the number. General Dow seems to have braved his confinement and sufferings beyond expectation. He looks comparatively well and is in the best of spirits. Another boat load is expected in a few days, and soon it is thought several thousand will arrive. We rejoice at this good news and the prospect of soon welcoming our suffering men to the land of plenty again.

On conversing with our returned prisoners we find that the general sentiment is, that the Sanitary and Christian Commission should not send any more boxes of stores to Richmond. They say the men do not receive them, they care not what has been published to the contrary. Officers perhaps do, the men do not. Those in charge at Belle Isle take whatever is sent and offer it to our men for sale. Several have told us, that boxes sent to them personally were never delivered. We think this charity is contributing more to the relief of the rebels than to our suffering men.

We sincerely hope that some move will be made by the people of the loyal States, to have a National Cemetery at Annapolis for the remains of the soldiers, who have died at Camp Parole, and the several Hospitals adjacent. Here if anywhere, such a cemetery should be erected, and that by the united effort and aid of all the States engaged in prosecuting this war for the Union. In the graveyard here, are buried, men from every Northern State. New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Maine, Massachusetts, and others are largely represented. We make an appeal through the Church to the people North, hoping that it will awaken some action on this subject. If such a cemetery could be erected at Gettysburg, why not here?

We have been interested in reading a pamphlet which Captain SAWYER kindly permitted us to look at, brought by him from the Rebel Capitol. It is a review of the "Administrations, Richmond and Washington." We make an extract of the state of things in Richmond, December, 1863:—"It was a sombre city at this period. An air of gloom pervaded the public offices. In Congress Mr. FOOTE told his endless story of official corruption and imbecility, and had savage jokes on 'the pepper Doctor of North Carolina' who ground the Commissariat of the Confederacy. There were no social gaieties, although disputable balls and gambling 'hells' still amused the immoral mobs. In the streets there was the perpetual juggle of bargain and sales, apparently unconscious of the war. But there was the seriousness of anxiety, if not the gloom of despair, in the home, the private sanctuary, in the public office, in every place where thoughtful minds contemplated the future, and looked beyond the circle of the twenty-four hours." Has the Rebel Congress or the winning of battles effected a removal of this gloom and despair?
