Liability of Teamsters, &c.

General Orders, No. 175.

 ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE.
 WASHINGTON, April 22, 1864.

Liability of teamsters, &c., to trial for disobedience of orders.

Great inconvenience and injury to the public service having arisen from the failure or refusal of teamsters and other employes of the Quartermaster's Department to go to the front and other points when so required, hereafter any employe of the Department who fails or refuses to obey such orders shall forfeit all pay and allowances which may be due to him, and will also be liable to arrest and trial before a military tribunal for disobedience of orders, according to the 60th Article of War.
