Except to vote, Mrs. McKeldin had not been out of the house all day. Teddy has just enough of a cold to confine him to the house. With the assistance of his 3-year-old sister, Clara, and a constantly ringing telephone, he didn't leave his mother much peace.

She was completely calm, however, when she later joined the Mayor-elect for acceptance of congratulations at Republican headquarters at the Lord Baltimore Hotel.

Wearing a smartly tailored navy blue silk suit topped by a small-brimmed white hat trimmed in blue, the slender matron, by her appearance, belied the fact that she had been married eighteen years.

Met At Bank

The young lawyer, with nothing but a future, met his wife when he went to work as a bookkeeper for the First National Bank. She was assistant in charge of the bookkeeping department and taught him to "un a ledger.
