

*Meeting of the Members of the Bar—Tributes of Respect*—At a meeting of members of the bar, held in the Superior court-room yesterday, at which Judge Martin presided, William Schley, Esq., as chairman of a committee appointed for the purpose, reported resolutions expressive of the sense of the meeting at the death of **Nathaniel Williams, Esq.** Mr. Schley prefaced the resolutions with a well-merited and eloquent eulogy on the character of the deceased. The resolutions were seconded by Wm. George Brown and Wm. H. Collins, Esqrs., and responded to by Judge Martin, after which they were unanimously adopted, as follows:

Resolved, That in the decease of **Nathaniel Williams**, one of our oldest brothers, the Baltimore bar has lost an honorable and honored member, society has lost a truly noble gentleman, and the public an eminent and useful citizen.

Resolved, That it is becoming and proper on this day, the fiftieth anniversary of the battle of North Point, to recall the fact that (although far away from home, when he heard that the British forces had entered the Chesapeake bay, and mediated an attack on Baltimore,) our deceased brother, then in the vigor of manhood, hastened home with all possible expedition; and, notwithstanding his exemption, as a Senator of Maryland, from military duty, joined as a private the gallant band of citizen soldiers, who met the invaders and saved our city from capture, he carrying to his grave the honorable scar from the severe wound which he received on the battle-field.

Resolved, That in respect to his memory we will wear the usual badge of mourning for thirty days.

Resolved, That an attested copy of the proceedings of this meeting be sent to the family of the deceased, and published in the newspapers of the city.

A second meeting of the members of the bar was subsequently held, at which Judge Martin presided, when resolutions of respect to the memory of Sheppard A. Leakin, Esq., were adopted, after appropriate tributes from the professional brethren of the deceased, and also from Judge Martin.
