Princeton Honors 'Shore Student Sun

Princeton, N.J., Feb. 25 [Special]—A student from Maryland's Eastern Shore, already chosen as one of next year's Rhodes scholars, today received the highest general distinction which Princeton University can confer upon an undergraduate.

Paul S. Sarbanes, of Salisbury, Md., is the 1954 winner of the M. Taylor Pyne Honor Prize.

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awarded to the senior who has most clearly demonstrated "excellent scholarship, manly qualities and effective support of the best interests of the university."

The student, who next year will go on with advanced work as a Rhodes scholar in Oxford University, England, is chairman of Princeton's Undergraduate Council, campus governing body, and secretary of the Class of 1954.

In presenting the Pyne Honor Prize to young Sarbanes, Dr. Harold W. Dodds, president of Princeton, said, in part:

"His excellent academic record has been achieved by intelligence and persistent effort. Outside the classroom these same qualities, coupled with good judgment, good will and a strong sense of responsibility, have brought him

a place of leadership in campus life, which he has exercised with effective concern for the best interests of his University."

The honor carries with it a \$750 cash award.
