

social club as such, but on the drawing of sex lines in these organizations. The theory seems to be that man and woman ought not to be separated in any phase of social life. If it is good for a man to belong to a secret society it is also good, on the theory of the equality of the sexes, for women to belong to the same society. Segregation on sex lines is unnatural in this view. It is probable that neither the men nor the women want to break down the barriers, but each may prefer to enjoy themselves in their own way without taking the other sex into clubroom and society hall. Can a woman keep a secret? Would she not be prone to gossip about the most sacred mysteries of Masonry, Odd Fellowship and the various other societies which men have organized for their own benefit? Isn't the head of this metaphysical-religious organization asking too much of her male followers? Are they always to "walk a chalk line" at the club and never to contribute to the gaiety of nations except in the presence of their wives, their sisters, their cousins and their aunts? Why should the lords of creation be disciplined with such severity? Why should lovely woman be privileged to see them as they really are in their hours of relaxation, thus acquiring dangerous material for certain lectures? It almost seems as if the men were not getting a "fair deal."
