

*Funeral of the late Jacob I. Cohen, Jr.*—The funeral of this estimable and much respected gentleman took place from his late residence, No. 115 North Charles street, yesterday afternoon, and was very largely attended, the insurance, banking, and business community generally being fully represented. The Rev. H. Hochheimer, of the Elden street synagogue, and Dr. Benjamin Szold, of the Hanover street synagogue, officiated. Messrs. Moses Weisenfeld, Julius Steiner, M. L. Strass, Lewis Seldner, Jacob Rose and A. Nachman, Esqrs., acted as pall bearers. There was no religious ceremony at the dwelling, but precisely at the hour designated, 4 P. M., the remains, which were in a plain coffin, covered with black cloth, were removed to the hearse, and the company present, all males, took the carriages, some forty in number, and followed the body to the Cohen private burial ground, on the south side of Saratoga street, east of Carey street. This burial place is, although surrounded by buildings, a secluded spot. The lot is about 200 feet front by 100 feet deep, surrounded by a high and substantial board fence, but inside of this, and enclosed by a thick brick wall some ten feet high is the burial place proper. Here lay the remains of all the deceased Cohen family, the adults, seven in number on one side, whilst opposite in a similar row, lay the remains of the children of the family. Each grave has a flat slab, one half of which is occupied with Hebrew characters, and the balance gives the name, age, &c., of the deceased in English. What is somewhat singular, the middle name of each male is Israel. There is a fine vault in the burial ground, for the receptacle of the dead, preparatory to final interment, and in this the remains of the deceased were placed. The services were conducted by the two Rabbis mentioned above, and were all in the Hebrew language, the immediate members of the family having their books in hand and making the responses at the proper intervals. And thus was laid away the remains of one of the best of citizens—a kind and benevolent gentleman.
