300 Men And Women Awarded  
Degrees And Diplomas At  
46th Commencement.

**DR. F. J. GOODNOW PRESIDES**

Announces Gifts Totaling \$7,750,-  
658 Were Made To University  
Last Year.

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to 21 students. There were six degrees of doctor of public health conferred and four degrees of doctor of science in hygiene. Four had the degree of bachelor of science in hygiene conferred upon them and certificates in public health were presented to six students. One degree of doctor of engineering was given.

**Dr. M. C. Thomas Honored.**

Conferring of degrees was brought to a close with the bestowal of an honorary degree of doctor of laws upon Dr. M. Carey Thomas. Dr. Thomas, who recently retired as president of Bryn Mawr College, was the first woman to attempt to enroll in Johns Hopkins University.

Dr. Goodnow conferred the degree upon her, after which Dr. R. V. D. Magoffin, chief marshal of the exercises, draped the Johns Hopkins cowl about her shoulders.

Presentation of a portrait of Dr. Lorrain S. Hulburt, professor of mathematics at the university, was one of the features of the exercises. Dr. Arthur O. Lovejoy presented the painting and the gift was accepted by Dr. Goodnow. The portrait was painted by E. L. Ipsen, of New York.

**Speaks On Revenues.**

Attention was called by Dr. Goodnow in his address to the financial support of the university. Despite the fact that since 1910 the university has received far greater financial support from sources outside the State than from within, he said, the university is doing much more for the local community than the country as a whole.

"For a considerable period after the foundation of the university," Dr. Goodnow said, "the only financial support which the institution received came from its local friends. Immediately after its establishment the university attained a national, if not an international position.

"Ten years after its foundation nearly 60 per cent. of its students came from outside the State. This national, rather than local appeal, which became stronger after the establishment of the medical school, continued up to 1912. In 1909, for example, more than two-thirds of our students were non-residents of Maryland.

**Student Body Local.**

"Notwithstanding the marked national appeal which the university has had almost from the beginning of its history, the first substantial contribution made to its endowment by a non-resident of the State came only in 1910. Since that date the gifts which have been made to the university from outside the State have amounted to much more than those which have been received from within the State. They
