## DIES AT AGE 71 Was Birth Control Pioneer

And Hopkins Staffer Dr. Bessie L. Moses, a Balti-

more birth control movement

leader since 1927 and co-recipient in 1950 with Mrs. Margaret Sanger of the Lasker Award of Planned

Parenthood-World Population, died yesterday at the home of her sister, Mrs. Walter Hollander,

Dr. Moses, an obstetrician and gynecologist who was on the staff of the Johns Hopkins Hospital and

also maintained a private practice, was 71. She had been living

at her sister's home at 2604 Queen Anne road since last March. Continued Her Work Her death came after a long struggle with cancer. Dr. Moses was hospitalized for ten weeks last spring and underwent an operation in January. She still con-

tinued her private practice at her office in the Medical Arts Building, however, and had kept appointments with patients through

While planning the clinic, she went to New York to confer with Mrs. Sanger, birth control's pioneer in America, and began the long friendship which culminated in their being the first women to

receive the Lasker award. The clinic she opened, new called the Planned Parenthood Clinic, remained at its Broadway location until 1963 and is now at 517 North Charles street, Dr. Moses remained its medical direc-

tor until her retirement in 1956. At the time of her death, she was still serving on the medical and lay boards of the Baltimore Planned Parenthood Association and was active as medical director emeritus of the clinic.

## Parents Opposed Dr. Moses came to medicine by

a long route and only after overcoming parental misgivings. She had degrees from both Johns Hopkins Women's Medical Goucher College and the Johns Alumnae Association.
