Dec. 5th, 1857. The session of the December term of our Circuit Court commenced to day with his Henor, Judge J. Parran Crane, on the bench. The appearance docket was first called. The preliminary call of the trial and appeal dockets was then made and judgments en-

tered in uncontested cases. The recognizance docket was next disposed of. On motion of B. H. Cantalier, Esq., H. V. Massey, Esq., of the Philadelphia bar, was admitted to practice in this Court Mr. R. E. King, colored, of Charles county, was also admitted to the bar Mr. King was examined for admission at the September Term, 1887, of the court, and was reported as qualified for admission, but as all applicants for admission to the bar are required by law to furnish the court with evidence of their good moral obaracter and as Mr. King was a stranger and non-resident of the county, the court deferred his admission until he should have furnished the necessary evidence as to character. This was done to-day and Mr. King was thereupon admitted a member of the bar of this Court. There being no other business the court at 12 o'clock, ml, adjourned until to-morrow
