The Surgeon General of the Marine Hospital Service is informed that junk dealers in Baltimore are purchasing large quantities of bettleking used on ocean steamships by emigrants, most of which is procured from quarantine stations. The matter will be brought to the attention of the different State authorities with a view to having the practice discontinued.
