

# THE DEAN MURDER.

## Grand Jury Investigation—Physicians Concur in Their Report.

DENTON, Md., April 9.—The grand jury continued its investigation of the murder of Sallie Dean today. Detectives Gault and Seibold testified and some persons from the immediate neighborhood where the tragedy occurred. One of the physicians who assisted in making the autopsy last Sunday and who gave information regarding the same was in error in stating that Dr. Duhadaway failed to sign the report. The report was signed by him also, and there was unanimity of opinion on all points of the examination.

The physicians who held the examination were in Denton today, and it is thought submitted their report to the grand jury. They are waiting for the result of an analysis of some secretions sent to a specialist in Baltimore. No presentments have as yet been made in the case, nor have any new developments to what is already known.

M. W. Wright, at whose house Mrs. Price, the wife of Marshall E. Price, staid on the night of her husband's arrest, says Mrs. Price gave a full account of the affair and was aware that her husband was implicated. On their return home from Dover Bridge on Monday following the murder and the day following the first determination on the part of the officers to arrest Price on suspicion she said Marshall told her where the knife was buried and said he knew a great deal about the murder. She further said, according to Mr. Wright's statement, that her husband went to the branch that morning and returned home shortly before 10 o'clock. She also requested Mr. Wright to see his brother and ask if he would not assist her in proving that Marshall was not away from the shops between 8 and 10 o'clock. She gave no hint that any one else was implicated in any way.

It is said that the court will adjourn until May 1 for the trial of Marshall E. Price, making a special session for the case. Edwin H. Brown, of Centreville, will assist the prosecution.

### Corkran's Hearing Postponed.

Marshall E. Price, who is accused of the murder of Miss Sallie Dean, of Harmony, Caroline county, Md., and Ulysses Grant Corkran, whom Price charged with being the principal in the crime, will not face each other in the City Court today, as was thought probable when the writ of habeas corpus in Corkran's behalf was sued out on Monday.

The hearing of the habeas corpus case had been fixed for 2 o'clock today before Judge Phelps, but was postponed until next Tuesday upon receipt of a telegram from State's Attorney Jump, of Caroline county, who stated that he could not be in Baltimore, as the grand jury is now investigating the murder. If Corkran is indicted in Caroline county, he will not be released on habeas corpus. If the charge made against him by Price is dismissed by the grand jury, it is thought that his release will not be resisted.

Mr. Howard Bryant, counsel for Corkran, said his purpose was to put Price on the witness-stand and confront him with Miss Dean's father, and also with Corkran and Corkran's little brother. The opinion was expressed by Mr. Bryant that Price would breakdown in his story and that Corkran's innocence would be shown.
