

STILL AFTER LYNCHERS.

Grand Jury For Anne Arundel to Return to That Probe After Finishing Election Investigation.

Continued probing into the Third district election matter was the order of the day before the Anne Arundel grand jury when its sessions were resumed this morning.

Several of the witnesses summoned in the matter yesterday and who did not get before the jury were on hand this morning and were cross-examined during the morning as to what they know of the entering of the polling house and apparent opening of the ballot box immediately after the polls closed on the night of the last election.

When the jury finishes with these witnesses, it is understood, the inquest will again direct its attention to the lynching of King Johnson, the colored man who was a victim of mob-law on the night of December 24.

It is understood that there is no more tangible clew now in possession of the State's Attorney than was at first located when the lynching took place and the colored witness, Chase, was brought to the Annapolis jail protesting that he was asleep and heard and saw no one of those who entered the Brooklyn lock-up and took Johnson out.

However, there seems every reason to assume that before it closes its investigation of the case, the jury will have before it Chief of Police Thomas Irwin, and the other members of the Brooklyn police force, in addition to about five or six other persons living at Brooklyn and Curtis Bay.
